The church of St. Andrew occupies a position in close proximity to Rochford Hall – once of great size and home of Sir Thomas Boleyn, Viscount Rochford, father of Anne.

The *piéce de résistance* of the church is the impressive west tower constructed of brick and bearing the arms above the west door of Thomas Butler, Earl of Ormond, 1515.

The church contains the enchanting and diminutive London F style brass commemorating Mary Dilcock who died on 14th December 1514. However, this meeting has been arranged to celebrate the recent introduction of the London B style brass depicting Thomas Stapel who died on the second day of March 1371. A rare example of a Serjeant-at-Arms with only two other examples remaining in the United Kingdom namely that commemorating Nicholas [Maudyt], Serjeant to Henry V, 1420, at Wandsworth, Surrey and John Borrell, Serjeant to Henry VIII, 1531, at Broxbourne, Hertfordshire. The Stapel brass is the earliest dated example and the eighth oldest brass to be found in the county of Essex.

The brass was moved to Sutton in 1957 following the closure and demolition of the church at Shopland. Sutton church has now been declared redundant and is in the process of being sold to a local landowner. The transfer of this important brass sets an important precedent in an era where the closure of churches is likely to increase.
